

## From the PTA President

Hi Everyone!

Welcome to 2012! I hope everyone enjoyed holiday break and had a chance to spend quality time with family and friends.

As many of you know, there is an issue of significant importance facing all members of the District 34 community. This past summer, the Board of Education initiated a five-step strategic budgeting process to address an anticipated budget shortfall. During the 2010-11 fiscal year, the District deficit spent by \$400,000. Projections show the District's expenditures will continue to outpace revenues for the foreseeable future without either expenditure reductions or revenue enhancements. During this fiscal year, the district deficit is projected to be approximately \$2.6 million.

The strategic budgeting process included several steps and an opportunity for staff and community input.

- **Step 1 – BAAC** - The Budget Alignment Advisory Committee was charged with establishing relative values for identified costs compared to other identified costs; the charge did not include recommending budget cuts or cost reductions. BAAC has reported its findings to the Board of Education on December 5, 2011. The full report is available on the District's website.
- **Step 2 – CFAC** - The Citizen's Finance Advisory Committee (CFAC) completed its work on financial projections for the future and reported to the Board

## From the Principals

Happy New Year! The holidays have come and gone and the new year has begun. We hope that your winter break was somewhat relaxing and rejuvenating and that you found time to breathe, read a little, play a little and sleep a lot!

One of the topics you may have heard about from your middle school child/children is that of learning targets. The district has been undergoing a series of curriculum reviews and teachers have been working diligently to ensure that the curriculum in each subject area is current, aligned with state standards, follows the common core of curricular instruction and has specific learning objectives with assessable outcomes for our students. One of the most significant findings in educational research is that when, "students are given clear *learning goals*, goals that describe the intended learning, they perform significantly better than students who are given *performance goals*, goals that focus on task completion (Black and Wiliam, 1998; Shepard, 2001).

Learning targets help our teachers focus the learning of the students in the classroom. Students who know and understand the learning targets tend to take ownership of the direction of their learning. Our teachers have been very focused on the daily posting of learning targets. The administrators in each school have been conducting "walkthroughs" in each teacher's classroom and have been tracking

of Education on Thursday, January 12, 2012. This report determined the specific deficit the District is facing now and in the future and is also available on the District's website.

- **Step 3 - SCENARIO DEVELOPMENT** - Based upon the information reported by from BAAC and CFAC, administrators will work to create budget reduction scenarios. While this group of administrators has in-depth knowledge of the operations of the District, the group plans to discuss ideas with others in the school system. They will also rely on both the BAAC and CFAC reports. The scenarios developed will be presented to the Board of Education on **Monday, February 6, 2012.**
- **Step 4 - PARENT, COMMUNITY AND STAFF FEEDBACK**

whether or not a target was posted and then asking students in the classroom what it is they are learning. Tracking this data and recording posted targets has allowed us to work with the staff to ensure that high quality targets are posted for our students to work from each day.

Learning targets come in four different types and we have identified six characteristics of high quality learning targets from the body of research available on the topic. The four types of learning targets are: process, reasoning, knowledge and skill. The targets also need to be assessable, measurable and observable. The six characteristics of a high-quality learning targets are: directly related to district curriculum map, clearly written in student-friendly language, fit logically into a progression of higher learning, learning oriented NOT activity oriented, time-bound ...focus of target contributes to limited duration (measurable/assessable/observable) and can gauge mastery. Typically when your child comes home, you might ask, "What did you do today?" The typical response is, "Nothing." However, if you ask your child, "What did you learn today?" you may get the same response, "Nothing." Try asking them what their learning target was in a particular subject area instead and see what they say. They might surprise you!

We are currently working through a five-year professional development plan to help us become very systematic and descriptive in our curriculum and instruction. Our goal is to keep the posting of clear learning targets embedded in teacher practice as we move into the areas of formative assessment and the development of a student learning continuum relative to weak and strong work. We are already seeing powerful examples of student ownership in the learning process and will see this continue as we move forward in our own learning.

**HOW ARE PARENTS NOTIFIED?**

There are several ways to find out if school is closed.

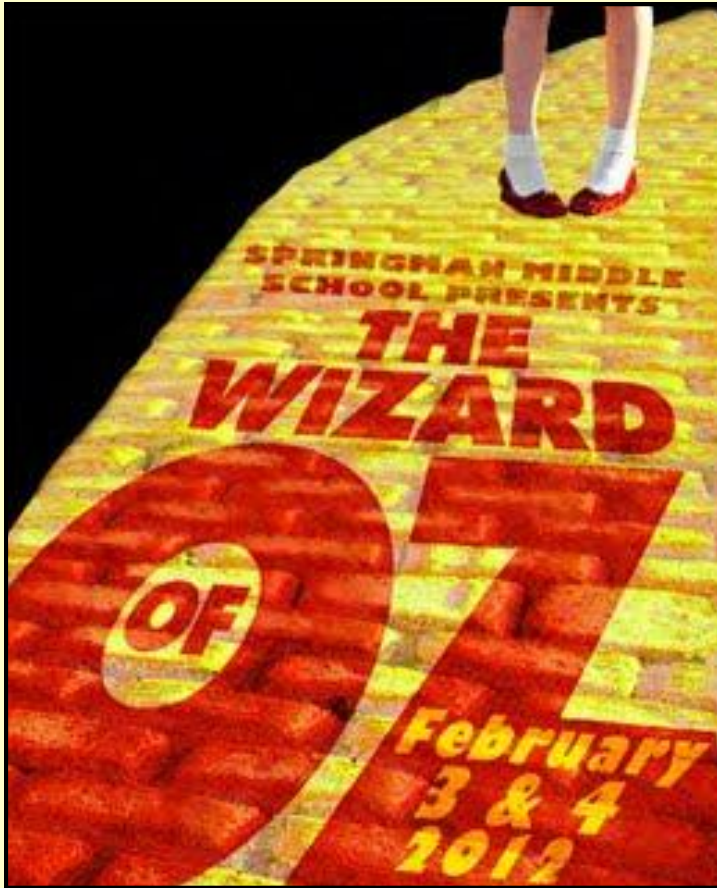
- Tune in to local radio: WGN (720-AM), WBBM (780-AM) and The Zone (94.7-FM).
- Tune in to local television: CBS, NBC, ABC, WGN, FOX and CLTV.
- Visit the District's website where the information will be posted on the front page.
- Visit the [school closing website](#).

Please do NOT call the school unless it is an emergency as that ties up the phone lines. In most cases, the District will initiate its calling and e-mail notification systems, as well as post the message on its twitter page, to alert parents if school is closed.

**WHEN IS THE DECISION MADE?**

Usually, the decision to close school is made at 5:30 a.m. or earlier so we can notify radio and TV stations and post the decision on our web site. If we wait longer to announce a closing, some parents will have already left for work, leaving their children unsupervised

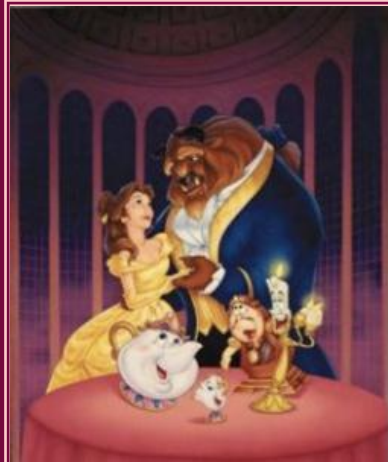

# Middle School Cafe Best Bites

## Spotlight on Fruits and Vegetables

We strive to provide a variety of fresh produce every day at all district schools and have done so for many years. We are also trying to use as much locally grown produce as possible, this has also been happening for several years.

So far this year, Attea and Springman Middle Schools have collectively provided a wide variety of fresh fruits and vegetables including:

- Nearly 625 pounds of chopped romaine lettuce
- 26 cases of red grapes- just over 546 pounds
- 64 cases or 512 pounds of Strawberries
- Wisconsin Fuji Apples, Fresh California Oranges and Florida Grapefruit
- A variety of vegetables including (while in season) Wisconsin Carrots, Cabbage, Broccoli, Cucumbers and Tomatoes.

One puzzling fact is that although these amounts seem like a lot, most kids at the middle school level don't choose fruits and vegetable. All of the "complete" meals include all you can eat fruit and vegetable options, and milk. At least six fruit and vegetable options are offered daily, with usually five of these options being fresh produce. Even though, there are so many options, only about 1 in 10 students choose to complete their meal with these fruit and vegetable options. This is a major concern, especially since the new USDA guidelines have come out; including making half of your plate fruits and vegetables.

The new USDA 2010 Dietary Guidelines for Americans include the new MyPlate guidelines. The guidelines include these tips for eating healthy and a great plate:

- Make half of your plate fruits and vegetables; include fruits and vegetables of various colors
- Balance your calories; find out how many calories YOU need for a day.
- Enjoy your food, but eat less
- Switch to fat-free or low-fat milk and dairy products
- Make half your grains whole grains
- Eat more vegetables, fruits, and whole grains
- Choose lean proteins



### You can help your child eat more fruits and vegetables at home:

- ◆ Keep lots of fresh fruit and veggies washed and available as snacks. Apples, pears, bananas, grapes, figs, raisin, carrot and celery sticks are all easy to eat on the run.
- ◆ Take your child to the grocery store. Let them see all the different fruits and vegetables and have them pick out new ones to try. Or, if you have a picky eater, let them choose what they like, for now. Work in new fruits and vegetables every month.

## 8th GRADE WASHINGTON D.C. TRIP



### Interesting facts and statistics from the DC Trip:

There were 232 students and 16 chaperones combined from Springman and Attea, five tour buses, four flights to DC and five flights back, and we had 88 rooms at The Embassy Suites Hotel spread over 10 floors. We visited more than 30 distinct historic sites including 11 monuments or memorials, and were on and off the buses 45 times--all within 72 actual hours spent in Virginia and Washington DC. And there was even time to make the traditional "grocery stop" Friday night, sing karaoke at a pizza buffet and swim and dance at a rec center on Saturday night, and attend a play Sunday night. The weather was cold but clear and the crowds were extremely small. At many sites our five buses were the only tour groups. As always, highlights included laying a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns, a visit to the Kennedy Center to see Shear Madness, a tour of the Capitol, a great morning at Mt. Vernon, and a moving tour of the Holocaust Museum. We also experienced two sites for the first time this year -- the new memorial to Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., and the 9/11 Memorial at the Pentagon.
